# The Washington, D.C. Defense Breakdown Economic Impact Report

- **9%:** In 2012, President Obama limited U.S. military capability to fighting one "regional conflict" and one "holding action." Defense budgets for 2013-2021 were cut **\$487 billion a 9% cut, at a minimum**.
- **18%:** "Sequestration," required by law in 2011, mandates \$500 billion more in 2013-2021 defense cuts an **18% cut, at a minimum**. President Obama said he will veto any changes Congress makes.
- <u>Be Prepared:</u> In 2013 these cuts in defense jobs and businesses will hit Washington, D.C. counties, cities and industries. This report shows how "National Average" defense budget reductions of at least 9% and 18% could affect Washington, D.C., using actual 2010 Washington, D.C. data.
- **Ask Questions:** In 2012, Congress and President Obama will decide on the specific defense budget cuts. In the next 6 months, find out if these defense cuts affect your community more or less than this national average. A 2011 nationwide economic impact study from the Center for Regional Analysis predicts that Washington DC could lose tens of thousands of jobs and billions of dollars under the "Sequestration" law:

- Washington, D.C. could lose 14,129 jobs.
- Washington, D.C.'s economy could lose \$834 million in lost earnings.
- Washington, D.C. could see a \$1.21 billion decrease in Gross State Product (GSP).

Congressional experts estimate Washington, D.C. could lose DOD military active-duty and DOD civilian jobs:

- Under "Sequestration," 2,237 military active-duty employees could lose their jobs.
- Under "Sequestration," 4,022 civilian DOD employees could lose their jobs.

## Washington, D.C. businesses will not escape the 9% and 18% cuts.

Public data for 2010 shows Washington, D.C. businesses earned over \$1.84 billion supporting America's defense:

- But under these 10-year defense cuts of at least 9%, Washington, D.C. annual business losses could be greater than \$166 million. Washington, D.C. businesses may have to fire workers.
- And at the "Sequestration" level of at least 18% in defense cuts, Washington, D.C. annual business losses could be greater than \$332 million. Some Washington, D.C. businesses may have to shut down.

### With at least 9% or 18% in planned budget cuts, Washington, D.C.'s small businesses will suffer.

From 2000-2010, **{TotalBusinesses} Washington, D.C. businesses** provided goods and services for America's national defense:

- **166 minority-owned businesses**, including 118 owned by Black Americans, 17 owned by Hispanic Americans, 4 owned by Native Americans, 11 owned by Asian-Pacific Americans, and 16 owned by other minority Americans.
- 144 small businesses including 52 "8A" and small disadvantaged businesses (SDB's)
- 87 woman-owned businesses
- 65 veteran-owned businesses, including 30 owned by service-disabled veterans
