# The Florida Defense Breakdown Economic Impact Report

- **9%:** In 2012, President Obama limited U.S. military capability to fighting one "regional conflict" and one "holding action." Defense budgets for 2013-2021 were cut **\$487 billion a 9% cut, at a minimum**.
- **18%:** "Sequestration," required by law in 2011, mandates \$500 billion more in 2013-2021 defense cuts an **18% cut, at a minimum**. President Obama said he will veto any changes Congress makes.
- <u>Be Prepared:</u> In 2013 these cuts in defense jobs and businesses will hit Florida counties, cities and industries.
   This report shows how "National Average" defense budget reductions of at least 9% and 18% could affect
   Florida, using actual 2010 Florida data.
- **Ask Questions:** In 2012, Congress and President Obama will decide on the specific defense budget cuts. In the next 6 months, find out if these defense cuts affect your community more or less than this national average. A 2011 nationwide economic impact study from the Center for Regional Analysis predicts that Florida could lose tens of thousands of jobs and billions of dollars under the "Sequestration" law:

- Florida could lose 39,246 jobs.
- Florida's economy could lose \$2.30 billion in lost earnings.
- Florida could see a \$3.35 billion decrease in Gross State Product (GSP).

## Congressional experts estimate Florida could lose DOD military active-duty and DOD civilian jobs:

- Under "Sequestration," 7,107 military active-duty employees could lose their jobs.
- Under "Sequestration," 7,107 civilian DOD employees could lose their jobs.

## Florida businesses will not escape the 9% and 18% cuts.

Public data for 2010 shows Florida businesses earned over \$14.10 billion supporting America's defense:

- But under these 10-year defense cuts of at least 9%, Florida annual business losses could be greater than \$1.27 billion. Florida businesses may have to fire workers.
- And at the "Sequestration" level of at least 18% in defense cuts, Florida annual business losses could be greater than \$2.54 billion. Some Florida businesses may have to shut down.

## With at least 9% or 18% in planned budget cuts, Florida's small businesses will suffer.

From 2000-2010, {TotalBusinesses} Florida businesses provided goods and services for America's national defense:

- 605 minority-owned businesses, including 134 owned by Black Americans, 298 owned by Hispanic Americans, 26 owned by Native Americans, 80 owned by Asian-Pacific Americans, and 67 owned by other minority Americans.
- 519 small businesses including 292 "8A" and small disadvantaged businesses (SDB's)
- **735 woman-owned** businesses
- 627 veteran-owned businesses, including 245 owned by service-disabled veterans
